STEP 2A

The Shop Must Shut

STEP 2B

Peg's Pub

I am Peg. I have the Topcat pub.

I am on my own in the pub.

I have no man in the pub but I have lots of pals.

Lots of the men and women in Readwell Road come into the Topcat and on Saturdays we have a quiz in the pub.

They all wish to win in the quiz.

They all have fun and drink lots of beer.

Ted and Sam come to the pub every day.

Ted has a wife . His wife is Jan and she stays at home in the week but she likes to come to the quiz on Saturdays.



Sam has no wife at home.

His ex wife has a flat in the next town.

Sam is on his own and likes to come to the pub every day.

Sam likes me. I like Sam.

We are good pals.

Sam lives next to the pub and helps me to run it.

I am happy with Sam and Sam is happy with me.

Maybe we will get together one day.



STEP 2C

Poor Old Jim

I am Nan. I am old.

Jim is my husband.

He is old. He has a bad back.

We have a big garden

Jim likes to work in his garden but the garden is too big for Jim.

I nag Jim as he works in the big garden.

He must not dig and weed the beds.

He must not mow the lawn.

His back is bad.

If he digs and weeds the beds too much

his back will be very bad and he will be in bed.



Jim can plant flowers in the beds and sow the seeds in the greenhouse.

He can wash the plant pots and look at the flowers but he must not dig or weed or mow the lawn.

Jim likes to dig and he likes to mow the lawn but I tell him to stop as his back is bad.

He does not like to wash the pots and sow the seeds. Jim likes to dig and mow the lawn but he must not do this or he will be very ill.

We must have some help in the garden.

I will ask for help.



STEP 2A Activities

The Shop

Suggested topics for discussion and research

How have supermarkets affected the existence of local shops?

Which customers suffer most from the closure of local shops and Post Offices?

What services are offered at the Post Office?

How have these changed in the last ten years?

What is an MP?

Vocabulary

Key words from step one are repeated at this stage and new ones are introduced.

The vocabulary at this stage is focused on words that can be decoded phonetically, introducing some consonant blends and digraphs. Words ending with 'll' are also used at this stage to introduce the general rule of keeping the sound of the preceding vowel hard by the use of two consonants.

Some common, social words are also introduced at this stage:

Post Office, town, supermarket, milk, bread, beer, local, customer.
