## Entry Level Alphabet Activities

Margaret Adams, the contributor, suggests ..
'Match those letters' game (pages 2-3):

1. Print pages $2 \& 3$ on card and cut into individual letters.
2. Play memory with students, asking them to match lower and upper case letters from page 2. Each time students find a pair, ask them to tell you what the letter is called and what the usual phoneme is that is associated to it.
3. Introduce a selection from the Times New Roman font on page 3, e.g. g \& a. Ask students to match these to the ones on page 2. Remember to encourage the learners to identify both the sound and the name.
'Fold the paper' activity (pages 4-6):
4. Move on to 'Fold the paper' questions 1-4.
'Alphabetical order' worksheet (page 7)
5. If students complete activity above ask them to continue with the alphabetical order sheet (place names), using one of their previous alphabet lists to assist as needed.
6. Final activity - maybe for homework - is to construct an alphabet quiz.
