-tch words

Tutor notes

Purpose

- To improve reading and spelling by identifying tch words in text and recognising this end cluster as a frequent pattern.
- To identify why and when suffixes –ing and -ed are added to root words and the impact this has on spelling.

Resources

- Story containing tch words
- Worksheet (page 5)
- Crossword (page 6)

Action plan

- Read text with student
- Discuss and ask questions to ensure student has understood main points
- Student to highlight/underline tch words. Emphasise sound. Ask student to 'feel' the tch sound.
- Student to complete activity sheet on page 5. Do not miss out the reading of the word. Keep emphasising feel/sound/letter pattern.
- Finish with crossword.
