Which? reveals its pick of the best supermarket mince pies Panel blind-tests 11 premium mince pies – and picks M&S as the favourites



Pastry, mincemeat and overall 'attractiveness' were all aspects upon which stores' pies were judged.

This year's best mince pies are from Marks & Spencer, according to baking experts at Which?.

The panel blind-tested 11 supermarket premium mince pies to uncover the most delicious, as well as the blandest, wettest and least appetising.

The best buy went to M&S Collection Mince Pies, priced at £2.50 for six and scoring 87% in the taste test. Which? experts said they had a "quintessentially Christmassy aroma", praising the "golden, buttery pastry" and the "boozy, fruity mincemeat" and describing them as attractive-looking pies.

Steer clear of Spar, whose luxury pies were judged by Which? to be bland and under-baked, while the "overly sweet" filling was too wet and lacked spice.

Iceland Luxury Mince Pies (£1.89) and Asda Extra Special All Butter Luxury Mince Pies (£1.50) were the runners up, scoring 73% apiece.

Iceland and Asda were the much cheaper joint runners-up, Iceland, perhaps better-known for its prawn rings and value-for-money frozen burgers, was a surprise runner-up. The tasters liked the star decoration, which partly exposed the "juicy" mincemeat underneath, but some experts said the filling lacked spice. Iceland Luxury Mince Pies sell for £1.89 for a packet of six – 25% cheaper than the M&S equivalent.

The other budget option that scored well were Asda's Extra Special All-Butter Luxury Mince Pies – at £1.50 a box, one of the cheapest in the test – which impressed with its "moist, well-flavoured" mincemeat, although the pastry was found to be pale and a little dry.

Waitrose's pies were jointly the most expensive with M&S but were the biggest let down. Which? said its No 1 All-Butter Mince Pies (£2.50 for six) looked appetising but the mincemeat disappointed, with one expert describing it as claggy.

Teaching notes



Background

Sparked after reading an article in The Guardian newspaper, and made in haste, this resource is aimed at Entry Level 3 (E3) and Level 1 (L1) learners but includes some E1-2 and L2 questions. There is no answer sheet – one *might* appear later for skillsworkshop contributors – but see below for general marking guidance.

Purpose

The resource is not intended to emulate formal summative assessment papers. Some questions are purposely challenging and open ended: designed to develop problem solving skills, and a questioning or curious attitude to statistics used in the media.

Level

There is also no detailed mapping page. However, most questions include relevant content descriptors in a grey font, along with suggested marks. E.g. Q3, *E3.11 = Round amounts of money to the nearest 10p or £1*. Questions are generally arranged by level, starting with E1 and finishing at L2. E3 learners could stop after Q9 but may want to continue. L1 and L2 learners should also start Q1 as some later questions rely on answers or information from earlier ones.

Marking guidance

Where there is more than one mark available, award one mark for the correct answer and reserve the other(s) for showing the correct process (working out) or for gathering the data to work with. For some questions allowing follow-through might be appropriate (e.g. Q14 if the learner got the answer to Q5 wrong). For Q3 I've allowed a maximum of 5 marks per column (rather than 11) because several prices occur more than once. **Maximum possible marks = 50.**

Calculator use

The calculator and non-calculator symbols are self-explanatory and should be observed if the learner is to get the most out of the resource. If a question has no symbol then a calculator is not forbidden but will probably not be any help!

My hope is that the questions prompt whole class (or small group) discussion. For example, the resource could be used to elicit seasonal discussion about:

- Using rounding to quickly estimate the total cost of a list of items.
- Comparing rounded totals to exact totals.
- Strategies for adding up a long list of numbers or prices. E.g. in Q5, add up all the £2.00s first.
- How statistics are used in newspaper articles and other everyday media.
- Do different averages (mean, mode, median) give different results? Why? Which one gives the most meaningful or useful result?
- Learners' favourite brand of mince pies (or mince pie recipes)!
