How your local library can help you find a job

Your local library may not be the first place you think of if you find yourself unemployed or looking for a job. You may be surprised by what we can offer. Here are just some of the ways we can help.

Books

The library has a wide range of books to help you. You can find out about interview skills, writing a CV or how to search for vacancies. Can't find a particular book? Ask staff if it is available to borrow from another library.

Computers

The library has computers and free internet access for members. You can set up an email account and search for jobs online. Printing facilities are available for a small charge.

Education

We have a range of resources to help you back into education. There is a well-stocked reference section and information on local college courses.

Job club

We hold a regular job club every Thursday. This is especially for people who have been unemployed for over six months. Please ask the Job Centre if you qualify.

Text C

Researching local history at Newtown Library

Many people are becoming more interested in finding out about local history. There has been an increase in enquiries about how to research the history of the local area.

Our community history room is located upstairs, opposite the meeting room. We have access to online history sites which library members can use for free. We also hold local records, newspaper articles, maps and photographs to help get you started.

Follow these simple tips to get started with your research.

1. Look on the web. There is a lot of information on the internet. Start with some simple search terms like your town name and the words 'local history.' This will usually find some useful sites. You may also find some local groups on social media where people share ideas, memories and photographs.

2. Visit your local museum. Museums hold lots of interesting items and staff will normally be happy to help although you may need to book an appointment.

3. Join an Adult Education course. Some colleges run local history courses. You can learn with other people who share your interest and have help from an experienced tutor.

4. Consult the experts. We have a community history librarian at Newtown library who can help you make a start.
