Minister defends 'miserable' jibe

A UK Government minister has been criticised for asking why Britons are "so bloody miserable" despite the current economic problems.

Line 1 The **comments** by Glasgow South MP Tom Harris first appeared in his blog on
Line 2 his website. Mr Harris, a transport minister, told BBC Radio he was comparing
Line 3 this generation with previous ones, who were not so healthy or wealthy.
Line 4 However, he apologised if how he made his comments had caused **offence**.

Line 5 In his blog post titled Heaven knows we're miserable now, Mr Harris said:
Line 6 "There are more two-car homes in Britain today than there are homes without a
Line 7 car at all.

Line 8 "We live longer, eat healthier (if we choose), have better access to forms of
Line 9 entertainment never **imagined** a generation ago (satellite TV, DVD, computer
Line 10 games), and the majority of us have fast access to the worldwide web which
Line 11 we use to enable even more spending and for entertainment. Crime is down.

Line 12 "So why is everyone so bloody **miserable**?"

Line 13 Speaking to Radio 5 Live, the MP defended his posting.

Line 14 He said: "If you read the **full** article I hope you'll understand that what I'm
Line 15 trying to do is actually make a **serious** point.

Line 16 "Even if I **accept** that phrase 'why is everyone so bloody miserable' - I wrote
Line 17 that in a **humorous** vein - I understand that if people want to take that as
Line 18 **offensive**, I apologise, that maybe it should have been phrased differently."

Line 19 He added: "I'm not belittling the **genuine** problems people are facing. I do
Line 20 think there is a more deep-seated cultural, even possibly spiritual problem that
Line 21 we have in this country where, is it about consumerism, is it about the instant
Line 22 **gratification** society, are we finding that buying stuff just doesn't make us as
Line 23 happy as we thought?"

Line 24 But the comments were **denounced** by shadow treasury chief secretary Philip
Line 25 Hammond, who accused him of living on a "different planet" from ordinary hard-
Line 26 working families.
