TEACHING NOTES

This is a resource which has worked well, especially with female groups. In the free writing section, teachers may well discover that many learners will chose to write their own love stories, rather than one of the easier options – and the results may cause a lot of group hilarity!

I used the short story 'Highland Fling' by Maureen Brannigan, taken from a collection of short stories contained in 'Sexy Shorts for the Beach' edited by Victoria Kirwan-Taylor (Accent Press).
